Pre-requisites	Familiarity with principles of economics and how different disciplines in social sciences and humanities work are desirable, though not absolutely necessary
Objectives (goals, type of students for whom useful, outcome etc)	The course explores questions such as what is the meaning of development, can we measure and track progress on development, and how do we reconcile economic growth, inequality and environmental sustainability. These questions are explained using diverse theoretical approaches - economic growth, human development, political economy, participation and post development.  The course is aimed at students who want to deepen their understanding of development issues and develop conceptual and methodological rigor in analyzing these.  At the end of the course, the students will have,  (a) a critical understanding of how theories and approaches to development emerged,  (b) an informed perspective on the assumptions and limitations of the different approaches, and,  (c) insights into the practical implications of applying the different approaches.
